Benefitting both people and places

Our 2022-23 impact report gives a snapshot of our work over the past year across our key regions and reflects how VIY combines national reach with a regional approach, ultimately delivering local impact for people and communities.

The 'people and place' impact stories in this report also reflect how VIY brings people together through volunteering and gives them a greater sense of belonging in their communities. This feels particularly important at a time when a [recent report on isolation and loneliness in the UK](#) highlights how young adults aged 16+ who are NEET* or at risk of becoming NEET (i.e. VIY's target audience) are at appreciably higher risk of becoming socially isolated and experiencing loneliness compared to young people who are not NEET/at risk. We know this can then severely impact on a young person's mental health, their opportunities to develop new skills and their future life chances.

We also know that the community places at the heart of each VIY project – from youth and community centres to sports facilities and arts and cultural venues – play a vital role in combatting isolation and loneliness by providing physical spaces for people to meet, interact, have fun and get involved.

So by challenging young people to help renovate and transform these facilities through VIY, developing new skills and boosting their health and wellbeing in the process, they really are, as we like to say, doing 'something constructive' that's good for themselves and also great for their community.

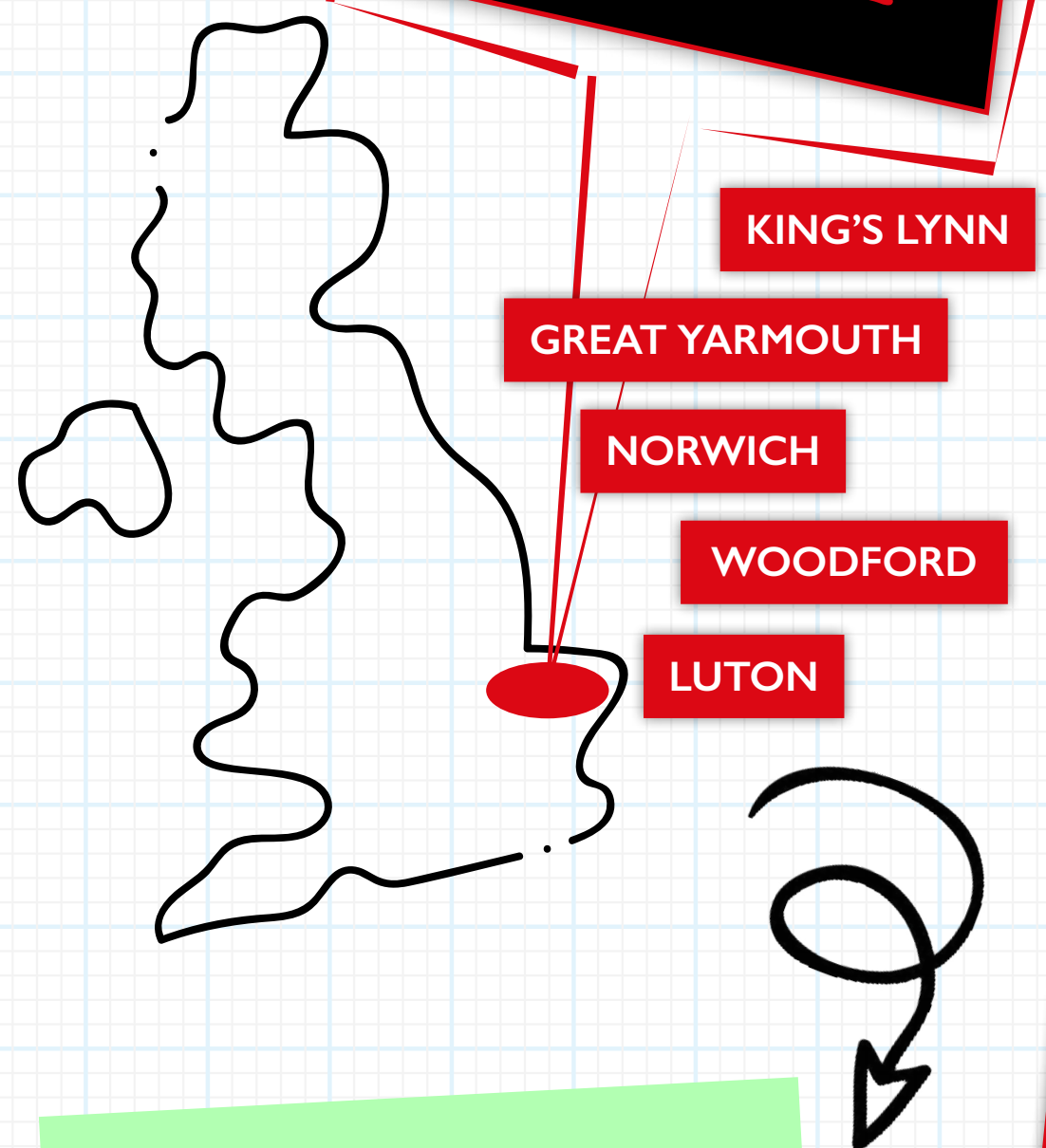

WORKING IN THE MOST DEPRIVED COMMUNITIES

VIY worked in Bedfordshire, Essex and Norfolk in 2022-23 – and Norfolk in particular has become a hub region for us. We have greatly expanded our activities across the county, delivering projects in the most deprived communities, thanks to funding from Norfolk County Council through the UK Community Renewal Fund (CRF)* – and also in partnership with Norwich Council's Neighbourhood Community Infrastructure Levy (NCIL) programme.

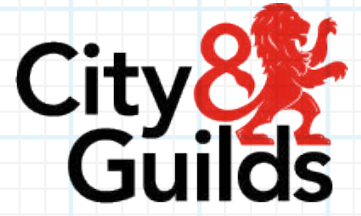

"I found this experience eye opening. I have never tried practical work before but have loved it! VIY has given me a career direction and I can't wait to start my carpentry course."

Honey was previously home-schooled then found herself NEET at 16. She joined the Aspire NEET re-engagement provision at City College Norwich to build her confidence and explore progression options for the future, having struggled in the classroom environment and staying focused.

Honey pushed herself outside of her comfort zone to give VIY a go, and loved it so much she's now volunteered on seven projects, achieving five Entry Level 3 City & Guilds accreditations. She really enjoyed being practical and getting stuck in. Honey has applied to do Level 1 Carpentry in September at City College Norwich.

- Strengthening partnerships to support NEET young people
- ✓ 105 students from City College Norwich have taken part in VIY in 2022-23
- ✓ Through the Aspire & MINT teams, who support those disengaged from education, who are home schooled or facing barriers to employment
- ✓ 28% have progressed back into further training or employment, like Honey
- ✓ 27% have volunteered again with VIY

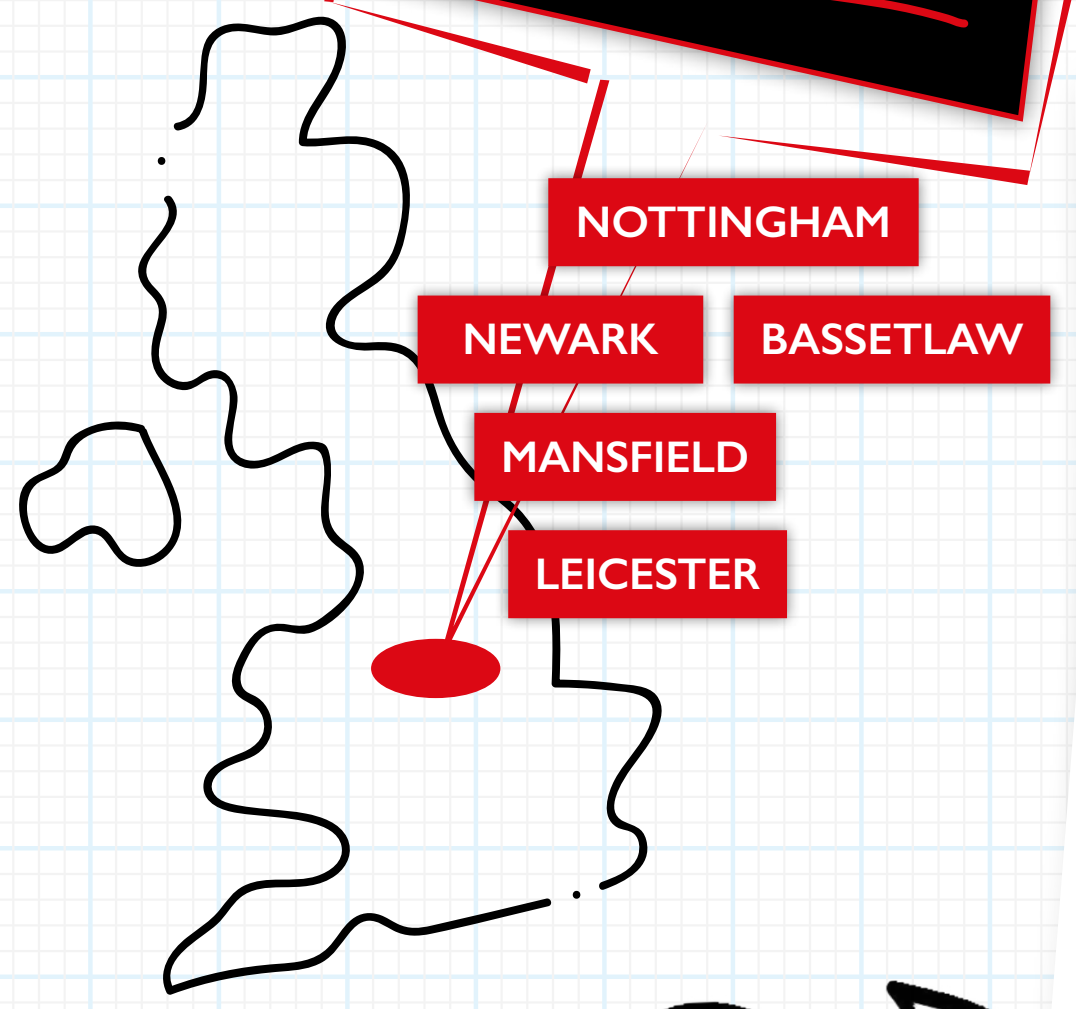
I have found that students who are very disengaged in college have thrived on the VIY projects where they are able to learn in a practical environment - and some have already decided to pursue vocational training in construction next year.

Much like Norfolk, Nottinghamshire and the wider East Midlands has been a growing hub region for VIY since 2022, thanks to the UK Community Renewal Fund, and now the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF)* too. With high levels of unemployment and low-paid work disproportionately affecting younger people, those from ethnic minorities, women and those with disabilities, Nottingham's vision is to build back fairer. Our work directly supports their vision to be a city which offers opportunities for everyone.



*The UK Shared Prosperity Fund is a central pillar of the UK government's Levelling Up agenda and provides £2.6 billion of funding for local investment by March 2025. The Fund aims to improve pride in place and increase life chances across the UK investing in communities and place, supporting local business, and people and skills.

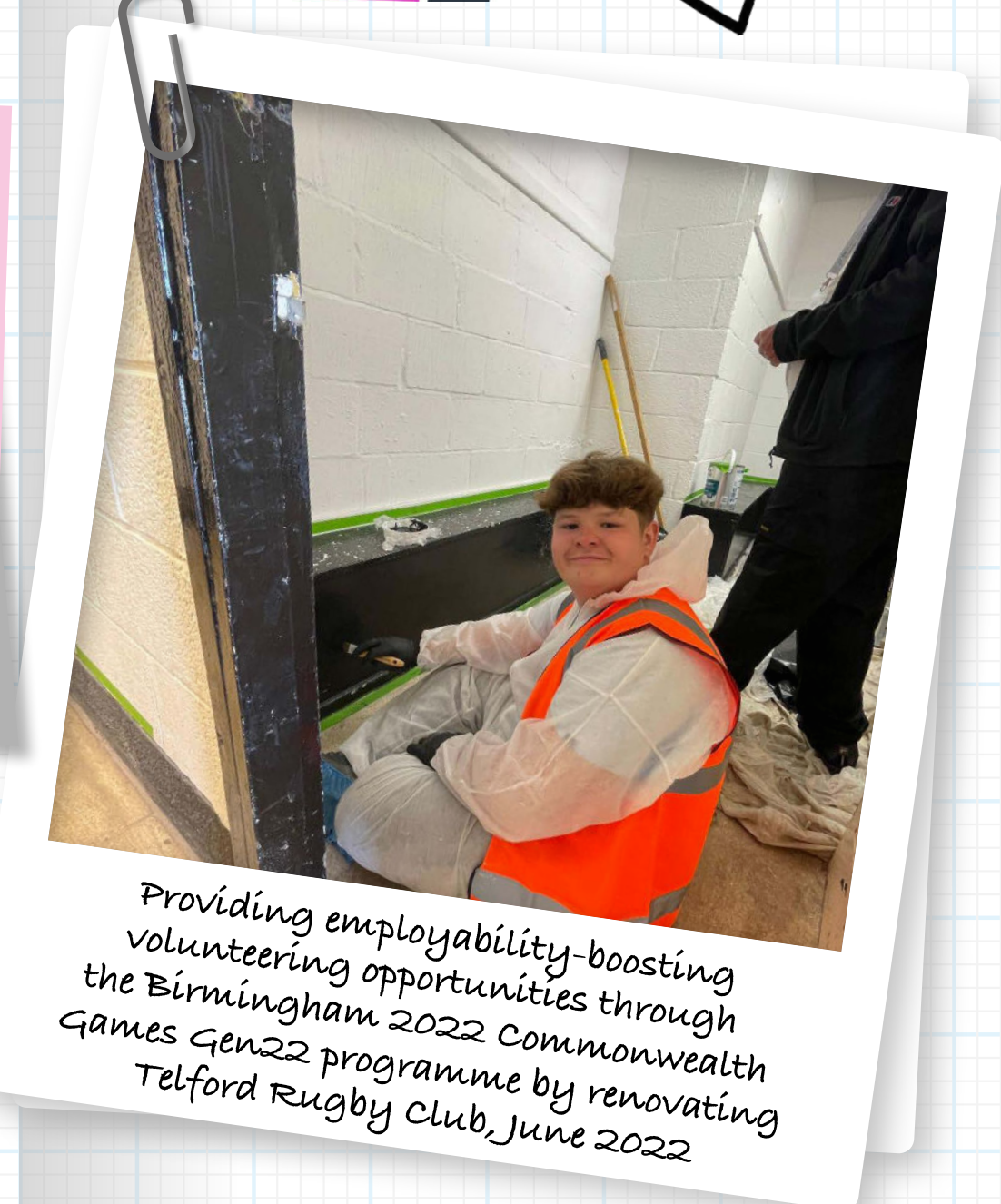

Whilst activity levels for young people and adults has recovered to pre-pandemic levels, there is still a way to go to help more people, particularly from ethnic minorities and more deprived neighbourhoods, to become more physically active. We continue to help develop local sports clubs and other active spaces across the country, building on the legacy of the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games - and with the support of Active Partnerships, Sport England and many of our brand partners.

Redditch needed a central space from which to help local young people



We converted two disused units, a former food bank underneath the Kingfisher Shopping Centre, into one space, complete with a new kitchen, storage for their outdoor sports activities and a full repaint. Fit for local youth work teams to use as an all new hub to work with young people in the town centre, with astounding outcomes:

- ✓ A dedicated space for youth outreach now signposted by NHS, Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) and local social services
- ✓ Safe space for 1:1 support
- ✓ High demand increasing staffing numbers

Insight from Luke Maguire, Enhanced Youth Support Officer, Redditch

"One young man had recently gone through substance misuse and looked unlikely to complete our course. By day three of the VIY Redditch Youth Hub project, this young man had actively decided against taking a substance the night before, all because he wanted to come in, complete his work and take ownership of what he was tasked with that day. This project potentially influenced a young man to make a decision that could have saved his life. That's the true impact VIY can make."

We'll now be working with Redditch and Bromsgrove District Councils through UKSPF to provide even more opportunities like this for local young people, whilst transforming seven local community spaces in 2023-24.

We saw young people who were normally school refusers turn up during their school holidays to join the VIY sessions. Of the young people who took part, two have already gone on to paid employment, two are being supported to gain a CSCS (Construction Skills Certification Scheme) card and one is training to obtain a forklift driving licence. The nature of the VIY project approach really does capture the hearts and minds of the young people who often fall through gaps with other services.

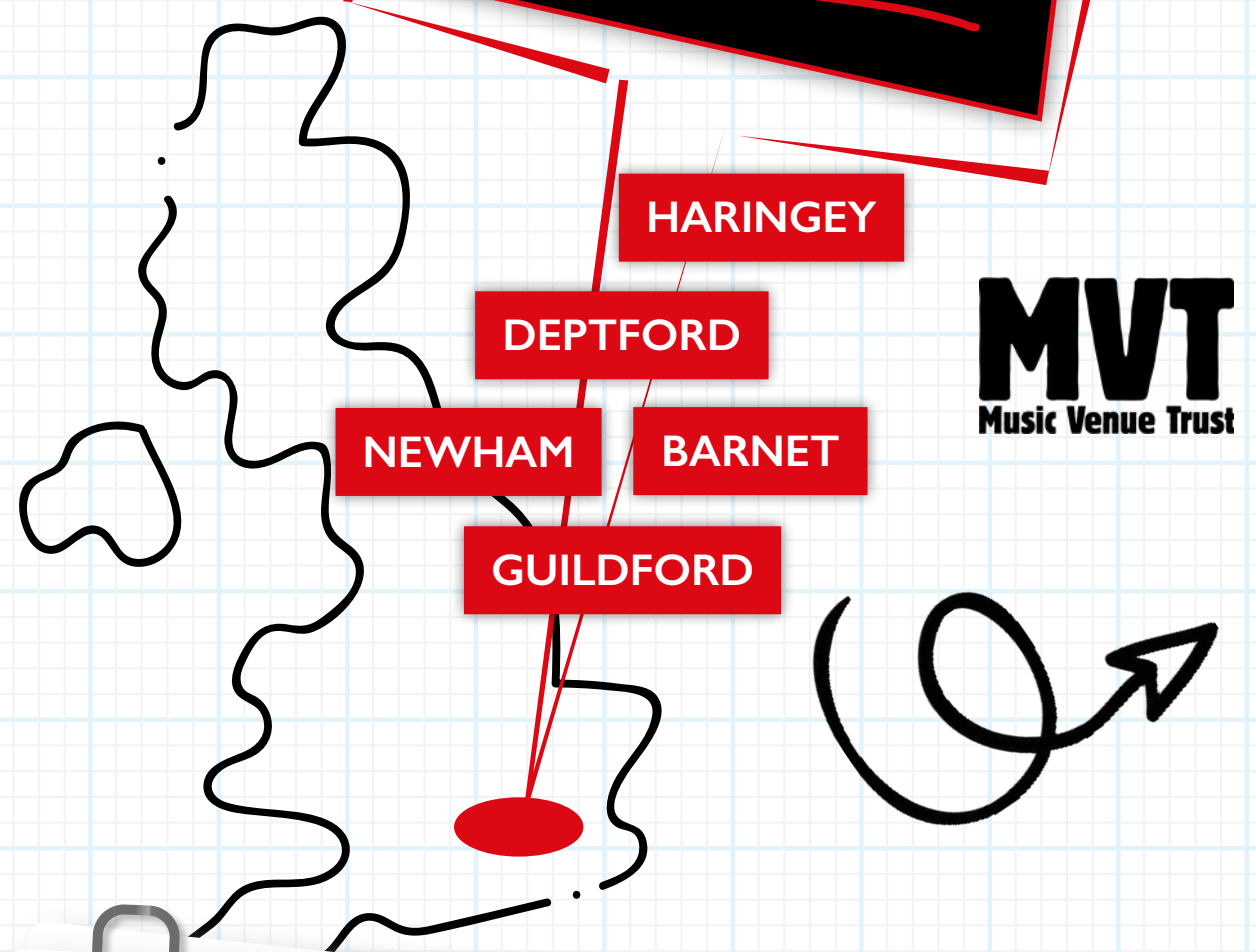

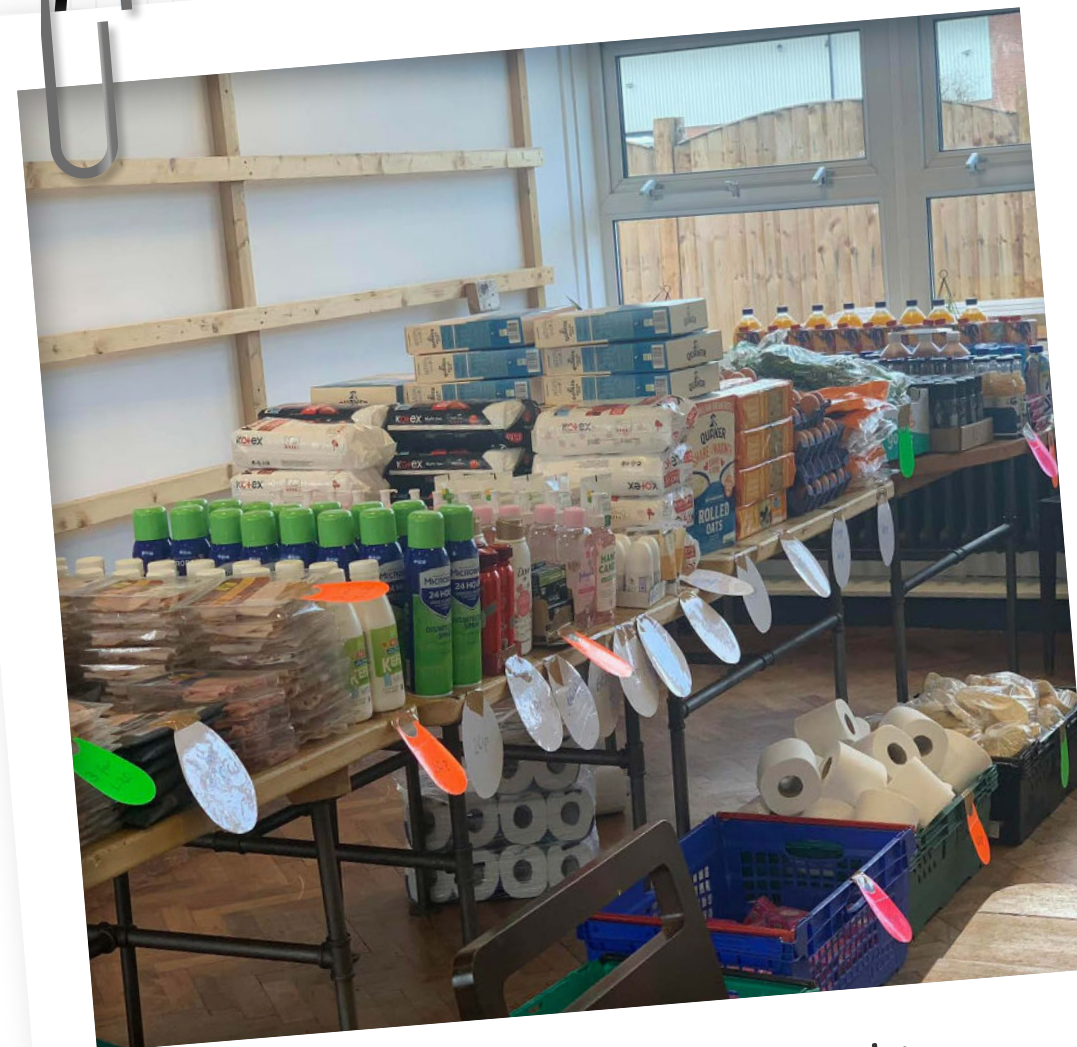


The Copper Pipe Café, Doncaster



The cafe has now worked with over 8 students from The Bridge with additional needs, all at risk of unemployment, offering work placements and supported internships. The students' hard work has paid off after being awarded the illustrious five star health & safety rating last year!

The space has also broadened its offer to provide other vital community services including baby sensory classes, a Community Pantry, helping over 100 local people access necessary and essential hygiene and food items each week, and a monthly community counsellor surgery. All of these services are supported by another 4 NEET paid young employees and volunteers through Cambeth Community Project CIC.
